 $\underline{\text{Headline } \#1}$ The United States says Canada dumping lumber in U.S. and states they will place a 27% tariff on Canadian lumber.

Headline #2 Canada says we are not dumping lumber and will fight tariffs
to the bitter end.

Headline #3 Canada says we are not dumping lumber, but 15% tariff better
than 27% tariff. (Was it Churchill who said some bitter - some end?)

Headline #4 Industry states if there is any tariff it should have only been 5%, and we are not dumping.

Headline #5 Provinces say they will never agree to 15% tariff.

Headline #6 B.C. government says stumpage too low.

Headline #7 Provinces agree to 15% tariff.

Headline #8 B.C. government increases stumpage fees and takes away 5% of allowable cut. Headline #9 B.C. government asks the Canadian government to ask the U.S. government if the stumpage increase is okay with them.

Headline #10 Environmentalists want all forests declared as national
parks.

Despite these emotional headline roller coaster rides, our businesses are here to stay. This conference is designed to get us back to the basics of wood protection, which results in forest conservation.
